Hyderabad: In a daylight robbery, a gang of four men Friday made away with about ₹31.50 lakh from a businessman's employee here after ramming their vehicle into his car. According to police, the employee collected ₹40 lakh from Vikarabad near here on his boss' instructions and was returning to the city in a cab. The robbers, suspected to be trailing them, hit the car near Shankarpally here.

Teen stabbed to death by friend

Kolkata: A 17-year-old student was stabbed to death during a violent altercation with his friend at Dakshineswar Metro Station here Friday afternoon, triggering panic among commuters and raising serious security concerns, a senior police officer said.

Abandoned building collapses, 1 injured

Jabalpur: A man was injured after a part of an abandoned 4-storey building of the Bharat Sanchar Nigam Limited (BSNL) collapsed in Jabalpur city Friday evening. The incident took place around 5 pm in Vikas Nagar, a day after heavy rains lashed the city. The building served as residential quarters for the officials of the then Department of Post and Telegraph had been abandoned 20 years ago.

IMA warns of strike in Maha Sept 18

Mumbai: The Indian Medical Association (IMA)'s Maharashtra chapter has warned of a strike September 18 if the state government does not withdraw its fresh notification on registration of homeopathic doctors who have completed certificate course in modern pharmacology. Earlier this year, the state government directed the Maharashtra Medical Council (MMC) to register homeopaths who had completed the one-year Certificate Course in Modern Pharmacology (CCMP), allowing such practitioners to prescribe allopathic medicines to patients in select cases.

Imphal, Sept 12: Prime Minister Narendra Modi is scheduled to embark on a three-day visit from September 13 to Mizoram, Manipur, Assam, West Bengal and Bihar to launch multi-crore infrastructure projects, participate in the birth centenary celebrations of Bharat Ratna Bhupen Hazarika and attend the Combined Commanders' Conference.

Addressing a press conference here, the chief secretary asserted that peace is “not only the absence of violence but also the presence of trust, harmony and reconciliation”.

Modi will interact with internally displaced people in Churachandpur and Imphal, and address two rallies during his visit to the state, he said. In a release, the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) said, “In line with his commitment to inclusive, sustainable and holistic development of Manipur, the PM will lay the foundation stone of multiple development projects worth over ₹7,300 crore at Churachandpur.”

Modi will also inaugurate multiple development projects worth more than ₹1,200 crore at Imphal, it said.

Reacting to the announcement of Modi's visit, the Congress claimed that the trip, instead of providing a force for peace and harmony, is actually going to be a “farce”.

In a post on X, Congress general secretary in charge of com-

munications Jairam Ramesh said, “So now it is official. The PM will spend less than 3 hours in Manipur tomorrow. This visit, instead of providing a force for peace and harmony, is actually going to be a farce”.

Manipur Congress president Keisham Meghachandra also alleged that Modi's visit to the ethnic violence-hit state is “merely symbolic”, and “not aimed at bringing peace and ensuring justice”.

During his press conference, Goel said the state government appreciates the efforts of the people of Manipur, both in the hills and valley, for “successfully moving forward to restore peace and normalcy” in Manipur. Manipur has been under the President's Rule since February, following the resignation of Chief Minister N Biren Singh. Goel also said, “Manipur is not just a border state but a central pillar of India's Act East Policy and gateway to South East Asia, proud guardian of India's diversity.”

According to officials, nearly 57000 internally displaced persons are staying in around 250 relief centres in the state till June this year. In the beginning (2023), there were more than 62000 IDPs, but many have returned to their homes after the law and order situation improved, former chief secretary P K Singh said in July this year.

“Giving details of Modi's Manipur visit, Goel said,”on his arrival in Churachandpur around 12.15 pm, he will first

interact with some IDPs (internally displaced persons) in the district.

He will lay the foundation stones for various infrastructure projects to be taken up throughout the state. The PM will address a public gathering at Peace Ground in Churachandpur.

Thereafter, he will arrive at Kangla around 2.30 pm and first interact with some IDPs, and he will inaugurate various developmental projects.

The PM will address a public gathering at Kangla, Goel said.

Among the projects, the PM will inaugurate the new Manipur Police headquarters built at a cost of ₹101 crore at Mantripukhri in Imphal and a civil secretariat constructed at a cost of ₹538 crore in the same locality.

From Churachandpur, Modi will lay the foundation stone for various projects, including the drainage and asset management improvement project worth ₹3,647 crore and the Manipur Infotech Development (MIND) project at ₹550 crore.

Though Modi's visit was officially announced only on Friday, the trip was talked about for nearly two weeks and the Manipur government had on Thursday evening put up a large billboard, announcing the PM's programmes at Churachandpur's Peace Ground and Kangla Fort in Imphal Saturday. The state government Thursday also issued an advisory, asking the public attending the “VVIP programme” in Peace Ground not to bring “key, pen, water bottle, bag, handkerchief, umbrella, lighter, match box, piece of cloth, any sharp objects or arms and ammunition”. Another notification that did not mention the Prime Minister's name asked people to avoid bringing children below 12 years and sick persons to the venue. The Manipur government had earlier banned air guns in Churachandpur district in view of Modi's visit.

Top court clears fresh ₹5K-cr payout to Sahara depositors

New Delhi, Sept 12: The Supreme Court Friday ordered the disbursal of ₹5,000 crore of over ₹24,000 crore deposited by Sahara Group with market regulator Securities and Exchange Board of India to repay dues of the depositors of the Sahara Group of Cooperative Societies.

A bench of Justices Surya Kant and Joymalya Bagchi allowed an application filed by the Centre seeking allocation of the amount lying in the SEBI-SAHARA refund account for payment to the depositors.

The top court also extended the date from December 31, 2025 to December 31, 2026 for disbursal of ₹5,000 crore to the depositors allocated in 2023.

The bench said the order was in line with the March 29, 2023 order where a similar application of the Centre was allowed for allocation of ₹5,000 crore to repay dues of the depositors of the Sahara Group of Cooperative Societies.

The amount of ₹5,000 crore



was directed to be transferred from the SEBI-Sahara Refund Account to the Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies, which was asked to disburse it to genuine depositors upon scrutiny.

The bench said the transfer of the amount should be done within a week under the supervision of former Supreme Court judge R Subhash Reddy and in the manner as outlined in the court's March, 2023 order. The Centre has filed an application in a PIL filed by one Pinak Pani Mohanty, who sought a direction to pay the amount to the depositors who invested in several chit fund companies and Sahara credit firms.

Nepal unrest: 70 jail escapees nabbed along int'l border

New Delhi, Sept 12: A total of 70 people, including a Bangladeshi national and some Indians, who are suspected to have fled from jails in Nepal during the recent anti-government protests have been apprehended along the international border in various states till now, officials said Friday.

All of these people have been largely caught by the border guarding force SSB and some by police forces of the states which border Nepal.

Individuals caught by the SSB have been handed over to the local police in respective states.

Some of them have been handed over to the Nepalese border force APF too, they said.

The Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB) has also issued three 24x7 emergency helpline numbers for the help of those Indians who are stranded in Nepal.

The force guards the unfenced 1,751-km-long India-Nepal international border that spans across 20 districts in five states.

Helpline no 1903 is operational in Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, West Bengal and Uttarakhand apart from two other lines at: 0522-2728816 and 0522-298657, an official said.

They added that the SSB and state police forces have apprehended a total of 70 people till now from the border which includes a Bangladeshi national and some Indians.

These people are stated to have escaped from various jails in Nepal that were attacked by mobs. Out of these, 38 people have been caught from along the international border in Bihar, 22 from Uttar Pradesh, 8 from Uttarakhand and 2 from West Bengal, the officials said.

Mumbai, Sept 12: Opposition parties in Maharashtra Friday slammed the BJP and the BCCI over the India-Pakistan Asia Cup cricket match scheduled for September 14, with Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Aaditya Thackeray asking if “blood and cricket can flow together.”

The Maharashtra Congress called it an insult to the kin of those killed in the Pahalgam terror attack and soldiers who have been martyred in the line of duty.

The Sharad Pawar-led NCP (SP) said the government's dual standards had been exposed after it allowed the match to proceed.

Responding to the criticism, Maharashtra minister and cricket administrator Ashish Shelar said international sporting events cannot be dictated by bilateral political stand-offs.

Talking to reporters, Thackeray said Pakistan has staged



multiple terror attacks inside India, and broadcasters in the country should boycott the India-Pakistan match.

“The BCCI is becoming anti-national. Why is the BCCI so excited about playing with Pakistan? Is it because of greed for money, TV revenue, advertisement revenue, or is it for the fees of players? When Pakistan can boycott Asia Cup just because it was in India, then why cannot the BCCI do

New Delhi, Sept 12: The Election Commission Friday told its officials handling social media in the states to hit back at misinformation with facts.

At a workshop here, officials dealing with media and social media at offices of state chief electoral officers (CEOs) were told that in light of the growing threat of misinformation, it is imperative to clearly communicate that elections in India are conducted strictly in accordance with the Constitution.

They were told to keep countering misleading information with facts.

Sessions were held to

strengthen the communication ecosystem of CEO offices to disseminate timely factual information to the media and other stakeholders.

The workshop had dedicated sessions on the Special Intensive Revision of electoral rolls from the perspective of media and social media.

An expert session on the various tools, techniques and strategies to counter misinformation was also organised.

“Why the Union government (is) silent on playing with a country that harbours terrorism,” he further said in another tweet.

Maharashtra Congress spokesperson Sachin Sawant told PTI that allowing the game to go ahead was a diplomatic failure and an insult to the kin of those killed in the Pahalgam terror attack and soldiers who have been martyred in the line of duty.

“Doesn't it show that the

temperature of the hot sindoore flowing in the veins of PM Narendra Modi has come down. He had said water and blood cannot go together. It looks like cricket runs and blood are allowed to flow together,” he further said.

“The cricket match has exposed the dual standards of the government and the ruling party whose politics revolves around India-Pakistan,” NCP (SP) spokesperson Jitendra Awhad told PTI.

Speaking elsewhere, BJP minister Shelar, who is also the BCCI's representative on the Asia Cricket Council Board, accused Shiv Sena (UBT) MP Sanjay Raut of adopting an “anti-India” position on the issue.

Mauritius PM offers prayers at Ram temple

Ayodhya (UP), Sept 12: Mauritius Prime Minister Navin Chandra Ramgoolam Friday offered prayers at the Ram temple here.

A 30-member delegation of Mauritius officials accompanied him. Earlier, on his arrival here, he was welcomed by Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath. ISRAELI STRIKES EXPOSE GULF STATES' VULNERABILITY

The Israeli strike on Hamas leadership in Qatar has shattered assumptions about the safety of Arab states, especially the Gulf monarchies, in the face of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's aggressive policies. For years, leaders in the region believed that diplomatic normalization with Israel, combined with billions of dollars funneled into Washington's coffers—and even extravagant



gestures like Qatar's gift of a luxury plane to Donald Trump—would buy them security. This week proved otherwise. Netanyahu has delivered a blunt message: Arab states that show sympathy for the Palestinian cause will pay a price. He makes no distinction between countries that are "friendly" to Israel and those that openly back Palestine. Doha has now learned that even alliances with Washington, and even hosting CENTCOM's regional headquarters, offer no shield against Israeli firepower.

The attack on Qatar is more than just another strike in a long and bloody conflict. It represents a turning point for the Gulf. The notion that proximity to the United States or dip-

lomatic ties with Israel insulate monarchies from regional upheaval has collapsed. Netanyahu has redrawn the rules of the game—and the Gulf states are now left to question whether they are players or targets.

The Gulf monarchies, defying widespread public support for the Palestinian cause, believed that securing peace with Israel would counter threats from Iran. However, Netanyahu has signaled that even they are not immune to attack.

David Mednicoff, Associate Professor of Middle Eastern Studies and Public Policy at UMass Amherst, says: "All this is more true in the immediate aftermath of Israel's attack in Qatar—the first time Israel has launched a direct strike within a Gulf Arab state. That action, even if ostensibly directed at Hamas, is likely to exacerbate tensions not only with Qatar but also place increasing stress on the calculus allied Gulf Arab countries make in their dealings with Israel."

The threat from a weakened Iran may have lessened, but Israel's recent aggressiveness has heightened security concerns across the Gulf states. Those Gulf countries that established diplomatic ties with Israel under the Abraham Accords now find themselves caught between a rock and a hard place. Their silence on the ongoing genocide in Gaza has drawn criticism and diminished their standing in the Muslim world, while at the same time, the looming threat of Israeli strikes has become a stark reality.

The U.S. reaction has been notably ambiguous. White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt stated that "unilaterally bombing inside Qatar, a sovereign nation and close ally of the United States that is working very hard and bravely taking risks with us to broker peace, does not advance Israel or America's goals." This lukewarm response raises doubts about historical U.S. security guarantees for its Gulf Arab allies.

The perception of the U.S. as a reliable protector of Gulf states has been eroding for years. Now, the region is confronting a harsh reality: no matter how much money they invest in Washington or how lavishly they court U.S. leaders, when it comes to Israel, they cannot count on American protection. The recent Israeli strikes were about more than Hamas—they were a stark demonstration of Israel's growing dominance and influence in the Gulf region.

Rajasthan's political landscape is witnessing a wave of developments that reveal both the dynamism and the tensions of governance in the state. The recent walkout by BJP in-charge Mohandas Agrawal from a key party meeting in Jaipur underscores growing unease within the ruling establishment. Low attendance and internal friction have raised questions about discipline and the party's ability to present a unified front as critical policy issues unfold.

Equally significant is the swift government response to allegations of corruption against Baran's Divisional Forest Officer Anil Kumar Yadav. Following charges raised in the Assembly by MLA Lalit Meena, the officer's suspension and the creation of a Special Investigation Team highlight a welcome readiness to confront corruption. Yet, these incidents also point to deeper concerns over administrative accountability.

Meanwhile, the state's judiciary is at the center of heated debate. Lawyers across Jaipur, Jodhpur, and Udaipur are striking against the proposed High Court bench in Bikaner, reflecting strong regional sentiments and the demand for a more equitable distribution of judicial resources. The Supreme Court's interim stay on the quashing of a corruption FIR against RAS officer Bharat Bhushan further demonstrates the judiciary's critical role in maintaining checks and balances.

Amid these controversies, the passage of the Rajasthan Fisheries Sector Amendment Bill, imposing stricter penalties for illegal fishing, is a reminder that legislative progress continues despite political turbulence. Together, these events capture a state at a political crossroads—where the fight for transparency, equitable justice, and party cohesion will define Rajasthan's immediate future.

DoT Issues Notice to Jio and Airtel Over Removal of 1GB/Day Plans

New Delhi: The Department of Telecommunications (DoT) has sent formal notices to telecom giants Reliance Jio and Bharti Airtel after the companies discontinued their most affordable daily data plans that offered 1GB per day. According to a Mint report, the DoT has sought detailed explanations regarding the withdrawal of these entry-level plans and the subsequent increase in tariffs. These 1GB-per-day plans have been popular among millions of budget-conscious users across India, particularly in rural and semi-urban areas where affordable internet is essential for education, entertainment, and small businesses. Their sudden removal has raised concerns about reduced affordability and accessibility of mobile data services, sparking public criticism and policy attention.

The department's notice questions whether the discontinuation of these plans violates consumer protection norms or the principles of fair pricing in the highly competitive telecom sector. In addition to seeking clarification from the operators, the DoT has directed the Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) to investigate the matter thoroughly and submit a comprehensive report. Industry analysts believe that telecom companies have been looking to improve revenue by pushing users toward higher-priced plans, citing increased network costs and a need for sustained investment in 5G infrastructure. However, consumer advocates argue that such moves disproportionately impact low-income users who rely on affordable internet to stay connected.

The outcome of the DoT's inquiry could influence future data pricing policies and determine whether telecom operators will be required to reinstate low-cost plans or face regulatory action.

Chittorgarh: The district administration has made elaborate arrangements for the constable recruitment exam scheduled for September 14. A total of 11 exam centres have been set up at the district headquarters, where 3,644 candidates will appear. The exam will be held in two shifts — morning 10 am to 12 noon and afternoon 3 pm to 5 pm. Entry for the morning session will be allowed only between 8 am and 9:30 am, while for the second session, candidates must enter between 1 pm and 2:30 pm.

DSPs and Inspectors to Head Each Centre



Superintendent of Police (SP) Manish Tripathi informed that strict security and monitoring have been ensured. Each exam centre will be supervised by a DSP and an Inspector. At the entrance, candidates will undergo document verification and frisking by one SI/ASI along with six constables, including women constables. At centres with more than 500 candidates, an ASI with six constables will be deployed, while at smaller centres (below 500 candidates), one ASI with three constables will be stationed. Additionally, one mobile team led by a DSP will cover every four centres. A vigilance team

headed by ASP (Sikrau) Mukesh Sankhla, along with the Tehsildar and CMHO, will monitor activities.

Over 350 Police Personnel Deployed

DSPs and Inspectors have also been assigned to guard the strong room where question papers are stored. The exam agency has appointed centre superintendents and observers. Candidates will be allowed entry only after biometric verification. Jammers and CCTV cameras have been installed at each centre. All staff on exam duty will not be allowed to carry mobile phones. The strong room and storage

facilities are under CCTV surveillance, monitored directly from police headquarters.

Additional SP Sarita Singh said that question papers will be escorted from the storage facility to centres under armed guard and SI supervision. Traffic police will also be deployed for smooth movement. The entire exam process will be video-recorded. In total, more than 350 police personnel will be deployed for security.

Biometric ID Mandatory, Mehndi or Ink on Fingers Not Allowed

Candidates will undergo biometric verification, in-

cluding facial recognition, thumb impressions, and frisking. If any candidate's identity fails to match in the biometric system, they will not be allowed to sit in the exam. Both thumbs must be clean, without mehndi, ink, or colour. Candidates must bring their admit card with a pasted passport-size colour photo, along with a valid ID (Aadhaar, PAN, Driving License, Passport, or Voter ID). Only transparent blue or black ball pens will be permitted.

Strict Dress Code and Restrictions

Male candidates can wear trousers, pyjamas, half-sleeve shirts, or T-shirts,

while female candidates must wear salwar-suit, sari, or kurta-blouse with sleeves. Only simple rubber bands are allowed in hair. Jewellery, rings, bangles, bracelets, brooches, large buttons, or metal buttons are strictly prohibited. Mobile phones, watches, calculators, Bluetooth devices, bags, purses, whiteners, geometry boxes, books, or study material will not be allowed inside.

Harsh Punishment for Cheating

SP Tripathi stated that warning notices will be displayed at all centres. Any candidate found using unfair means will face strict action — including fines ranging from 10 lakh to 10 crore and imprisonment from 10 years to life. Such candidates will also be barred from appearing in the next two recruitment exams.

The SP appealed to all candidates to appear with honesty and integrity, assuring that the administration has taken every possible step to conduct the exam in a fair and transparent manner.

Chittorgarh – Fake Liquor Bust: Huge Stock Seized in Police-Backed Operation

Chittorgarh The Excise Department carried out a major operation against a gang involved in the production and sale of counterfeit liquor in the district. The action was conducted under the directives of the Excise Commissioner and the Chittorgarh Collector, led by District Excise Officer Gajendra Singh Rajpurohit. He was assisted by Assistant Excise Officer Jagdish Ram Bishnoi, Nimbahera Excise Enforcement Officer Hemraj Jat, and Shravan Lal Meena. The team, in collaboration with the police, raided the hilly forest areas between Paroli and Borda villages, where a large cache of materials used for manufacturing fake liquor was found.

glycerin, colored liquids, food coloring, alcohol meters, seals, and stamp pads, all intended to make the counterfeit liquor appear authentic.

Link to Previous Case

Authorities stated that this operation is connected to an earlier fake liquor case, in which five individuals were already arrested. The investigation is ongoing to determine if the same people are involved in this new case. All seized items have been sealed, and further investigation is underway.

Fake Liquor Supply Across States

The probe revealed that the counterfeit liquor was being supplied to different parts of Rajasthan and Gujarat. Several contractors selling discounted liquor in the market are also under suspicion. Officials believe that this gang has been operating for a long time, posing serious health risks to consumers.

Massive Quantity of Contraband Seized

During the raid, officials recovered approximately 6,600 empty bottles (180 ml), around 25,750 fake caps branded as County Club, Whiteless Vodka, and Rana Desi, 96 small filled bottles, and 410 cartons used for packaging. Additionally, 8,270 fake holograms and 24,988 counterfeit labels were seized.

The team also confiscated chemicals and materials used in production, including essence,

District Excise Officer Gajendra Singh Rajpurohit warned that consuming counterfeit liquor can be life-threatening. He urged the public to avoid buying heavily discounted or suspiciously cheap liquor, as it could be fake and hazardous to health.

Ajmer Bids Farewell to Brave Airman Pulkit

Ajmer: Tears, grief, and pride marked the farewell of Air Force jawan Pulkit (26), who died in a tragic incident at Hasimara Air Force Station in West Bengal. His last rites were performed in Ajmer on Friday with full military honours. Pulkit's mortal remains reached Ajmer on Friday morning. Draped in the Tricolour, the coffin was received with respect by relatives, neighbours, and

ex-servicemen. After final viewing at his ancestral home in Ram Nagar, the funeral procession passed through city streets, where locals paid solemn tributes.

According to his father, Rajendra Prasad, an LIC officer, Pulkit was shot on the evening of September 9. The circumstances of the incident are under investigation. "We are still waiting for clarity, but we are proud of him. For Pulkit, wearing the uniform was the greatest honour," his father said with tears in his eyes.

A Dream Fulfilled

Pulkit, the only son of the family, grew up in Kotda, Ajmer. A bright student, he completed his B.Tech before joining the Indian Air Force in 2018. His first post-

ing was in Bengaluru. Later, he was stationed in Ferozepur, Punjab, where he served during Operation Sindoor.

On September 3, Pulkit returned home on leave and just two days later celebrated his 26th birthday in Jaipur with his sisters. Four days after the celebration, tragedy struck.

He Lived for the Uniform

Family members recalled his unwavering dream of serving in the armed forces. "He was disciplined, dedicated, and deeply passionate about serving the nation. From childhood, he dreamt of flying and wearing the uniform," his father said. Pulkit is survived by his parents and two elder sisters.

Demolition Begins on Ajmer's Seven Wonders Structures After Supreme Court Order

Ajmer: The Ajmer Development Authority (ADA) on Friday began demolishing the "Seven Wonders" replicas constructed in the Anasagar Wetland area, following directions from the Supreme Court.

The replicas, built in 2022 under the Smart City Project at a cost of around 12 crore and inaugurated by then Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot, were declared ille-



gal encroachments. Six months ago, the Court had ordered their removal, but until now, only one structure had been razed. With tenders invited for the remaining work, demolition is now underway and is expected to be completed by September 17, according to a district administration affidavit.

NGT Petition and Orders

The action stems from a petition filed in March 2023 by former BJP councilor Ashok Malik in the National Green Tribunal (NGT), alleging that construction projects

around Anasagar Lake—including Seven Wonders Park, Patel Stadium, Gandhi Smriti Udyan, and food courts—were damaging wetlands and violating the city's master plan. On August 11, 2023, the NGT's Bhopal bench ordered demolition of the structures.

Supreme Court's Observation*

When the matter reached the Supreme Court in March 2025, the bench strongly criticized the Smart City approach, remarking: "Your working method does not seem to indicate that you want to make Ajmer smart. We are surprised how a city can become smart without the protection of water bodies, wetlands, and how a city can become smart by encroaching on them."

Pharmacology Expert Honoured for Global Impact

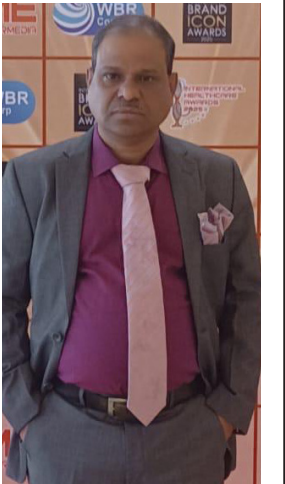
