Indian Army Chief’s Powerful Statement on Global Uncertainty and Future Warfare

Drawing attention to the volatile international environment, he remarked with sharp wit, “Even Trump doesn’t know what he’ll do tomorrow,” symbolizing the unpredictability of modern geopolitics and leadership. The comment sparked widespread discussion among defense analysts, who view it as a reminder of the uncertain global order where decisions by major powers can reshape the balance overnight. He empha-



sized that India’s armed forces are rapidly modernizing to tackle multi-dimensional threats — from cyber warfare and drone attacks to information manipulation and satellite defense. The Chief reiterated the importance of joint preparedness among all three wings of the military, technological innovation, and stronger international partnerships. “We must be ready on all fronts,” he said, underscoring India’s commitment to national security and strategic readiness in a world where the next crisis could unfold without warning. His address was both a warning and a call to action — urging policymakers, scientists, and soldiers alike to prepare for a future that refuses to wait.

Indo-Pacific Must Remain Free from Coercion, Says Defence Minister Rajnath Singh

New Delhi: Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Friday reaffirmed India’s steadfast commitment to ensuring that the Indo-Pacific region remains free, open, and free from any form of coercion, asserting that peace and stability in the region are crucial for global prosperity.

Speaking at a high-level defence dialogue in New Delhi, Singh emphasized that the Indo-Pacific has emerged as the “engine of global growth,” but warned that increasing military assertiveness and strategic rivalries pose serious challenges to regional harmony. “The Indo-Pacific must remain free from coercion



and hegemonic designs. Nations must respect international law, sovereignty, and the freedom of navigation,”

he said, in what was seen as a veiled reference to China’s growing influence in the region.

The Defence Minister highlighted India’s vision of ‘Security and Growth for All in the Region’ (SAGAR),

which focuses on cooperative security, maritime stability, and sustainable development. He reiterated

that India’s partnerships with like-minded countries—including members of the Quad—are aimed at promoting transparency, trust, and shared prosperity, not confrontation. Rajnath Singh also underlined India’s expanding role as a reliable partner in humanitarian assistance, disaster relief, and maritime domain awareness. “Our goal is not dominance but peaceful coexistence,” he added. Analysts view Singh’s remarks as a strong reaffirmation of India’s strategic autonomy and its balanced approach to countering coercive practices while preserving freedom of navigation and regional sovereignty in the Indo-Pacific.

Countdown Begins for ISRO’s Heaviest Military Communication Satellite CMS-03

The countdown has officially begun for the launch of the Indian Space Research Organisation’s (ISRO) heaviest communication satellite, CMS-03, a mission that marks another milestone in India’s space and defense capabilities. Scheduled for launch this November, the satellite will significantly enhance secure communication services for the Indian Armed Forces, bolstering the country’s strategic and surveillance infrastructure.

CMS-03 will be launched aboard the

GSLV Mk III (Geosynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle), ISRO’s most powerful rocket, from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Sriharikota. With a launch mass exceeding 5,000 kilograms, the satellite is designed to provide advanced, encrypted, and high-capacity communication links across land, air, and sea domains. According to ISRO officials, CMS-03 will ensure seamless connectivity for defense networks, especially in remote and border regions, supporting command, control, and co-

ordination among military units. It also promises to enhance India’s preparedness for real-time data relay and secure operations under complex conditions.

This mission underscores ISRO’s growing role in strengthening India’s national security framework while advancing indigenous space technology. As the countdown proceeds, the nation awaits another proud moment in its journey towards self-reliance in strategic communication and space defense.

Emotional Intelligence — The Silent Power Shaping Human Destiny



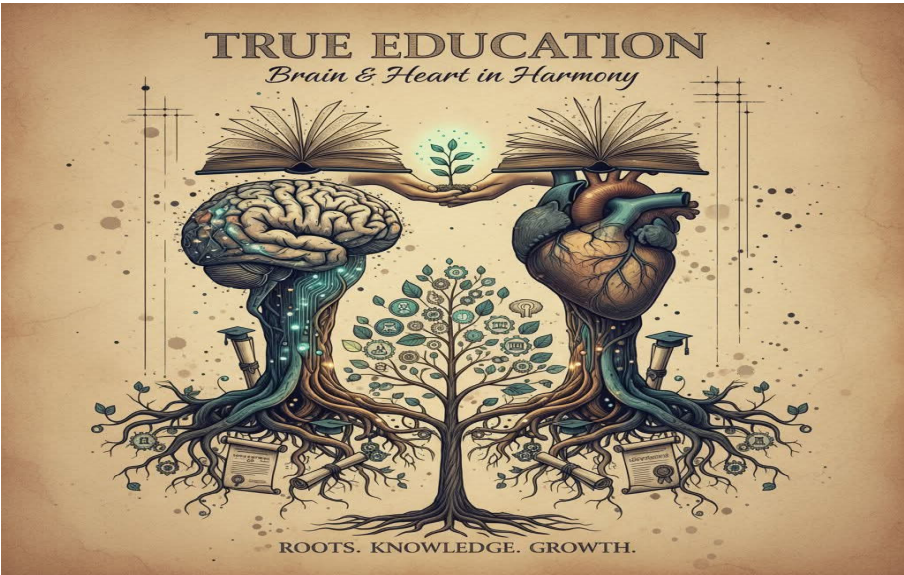

Kharge, Sonia, Rahul lead Cong’s star campaigners’ list for 2nd phase of Bihar polls

New Delhi : The Congress on Sunday released the list of 40 star campaigners for the second phase of the Bihar Legislative Assembly elections, scheduled to be held on November 11. The list includes top national leaders and prominent state figures, signalling an all-out campaign push by the party to strengthen its presence in the state ahead of polling.

Leading the list is Congress President Mallikarjun Kharge, followed by Sonia Gandhi, Rahul Gandhi, and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, who are expected to dominate the party’s major rallies and public meetings across key constituencies.

Senior leaders such as Ashok Gehlot, Bhupesh Baghel, Digvijaya Singh, Adhir Ranjan Choudhary, and Sachin Pilot are also among the prominent campaigners who will spearhead outreach efforts in different regions.

Other notable figures in the list include K.C. Venugopal, Pawan Khera, Randeep Singh Surjewala, Imran Pratapgarhi, Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu, Tariq Anwar, Meira Kumar, Gaurav Gogoi, Ranjeet Ranjan, Jignesh Mevani, Syed Naseer Husain, Rajesh Ranjan (Pappu Yadav), and Rajendra Pal

Gautam. Several senior Bihar Congress leaders, such as Madan Mohan Jha, Sha-keel Ahmad Khan, Sukhdeo Bhagat, Rajesh Kumar Ram, Akhilesh Prasad Singh, and Furqan Ansari, are also part of the list.

Rising leaders like Kan-haiya Kumar, Supriya Shrin-ate, Pramod Tiwari, Krishna Allavaru, Ajay Rai, and Anil Jaihind have been included to appeal to younger voters and strengthen the Congress campaign at the grassroots level. The inclusion of diverse leaders from across the country reflects the party’s attempt to project unity and energy within the INDIA bloc ahead of the crucial second phase.

Senior Congress functionaries said the star campaigners will focus on issues such as employment, inflation, farmers’ distress, and women’s welfare, while also highlighting alleged governance failures under the NDA government. In the first phase of the Bihar Assembly polls, voting for several constituencies is scheduled on November 6, with the second phase to follow on November 11, and the counting of votes on November 14, according to the Election Commission of India.

India’s Pride: Para-Athlete Pooja Garg Selected for National Award 2025 — A Story of Courage, Resilience, and Triumph

India celebrates the indomitable spirit of its daughter, Pooja Garg, an international para-athlete from Madhya Pradesh, who has been selected for the “National Award 2025” under the Best Individual with Locomotor Disability category by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India.

The award, to be conferred by the President of India in December 2025, recognizes not just her achievements in sports but also her extraordi-

nary journey of determination, courage, and national pride. Pooja’s life is a story of grit against all odds. After a life-changing spinal cord injury in 2010 left her unable to walk, she endured 13 major surgeries and a long rehabilitation process. Yet, she refused to surrender. Even when faced with cancer, she fought back — and emerged victorious once again. Through sheer willpower, Pooja transformed her pain into purpose. Today, she stands as one of India’s most respected international

para canoe athletes, having won two bronze medals for India at the Asian Para Canoe Championship 2025 in Thailand. In 2024, Pooja achieved another milestone when she rode a motorbike to Nathula Pass (14,400 ft, Sikkim) and unfurled the Indian tricolour — a feat recognized by the World Book of Records, London. Beyond sports, Pooja is a social reformer and founder of “Pankhon Ki Udaan Charitable Foundation”, conducting campaigns on good touch–bad touch awareness, self-defense, cancer education,

and sports motivation across India — inspiring thousands of children and youth. **Speaking on her selection, Pooja said,** > “This award is not just mine — it belongs to everyone who refuses to give up. It’s for every girl and every differently-abled person who dares to dream beyond limitations.” Pooja Garg’s journey is more than a tale of personal victory — it is a reminder that real strength is not about what you can do, but about what you overcome.

Trans-Himalayan regions in Himachal home to 83 snow leopards: Study

The trans-Himalayan ecosystem in Himachal is home to wide-roaming 83 snow leopards, an iconic species often referred to as the “Ghost of the Mountain”, a major rise from 51 as per the previous assessment in 2021. The second round of snow leopard population assessment, conducted by the

state Wildlife Wing in collaboration with the Nature Conservation Foundation from 2024-25 in 26,000 sq km of the snow leopard habitat dotted across rugged mountains and precipitous valleys with limited accessibility during winter, indicates its density ranged from 0.16 to 0.53 individuals per 100 sq km. The trans-Himalayan

regions of the upper Spiti landscape and Pin, both in the Lahaul-Spiti district, recorded the highest densities of snow leopards, with the region of Kinnaur and Tabo being the regions with high densities. Lahaul-Pangi and the Great Himalayan National Park (GHNP), a UNESCO World Heritage Site, were regions with lower

densities. The derived density of snow leopards across the state was 0.35 (0.23-0.53) individuals per 100 sq km with an estimated sigma of 5.2 (4.7-5.8) km. Besides Himachal, the snow leopard is also found across Jammu and Kashmir; Ladakh, Uttarakhand, Sikkim, and Arunachal Pradesh.

President Murmu to address Uttarakhand Assembly on state’s silver jubilee

President Droupadi Murmu will visit Uttarakhand from November 2 to 4, during which she will address the state Assembly to mark the silver jubilee of the creation of the hill state, an official said on Saturday.

On November 2, the President will attend the second convocation ceremony of the University of Patanjali at Haridwar, the official said in a statement.

On November 3, the President will address the Uttarakhand Legislative Assembly at Dehradun on the silver jubilee of Uttarakhand state. On the same day, she will attend a function to commemorate the 125 years of the establishment of the Raj Bhavan, Nainital. On November 4, the President will visit the Neem Karoli Baba Ashram at Kainchi Dham. Before returning to New Delhi, the President will also chair the 20th convocation



of Kumaun University at Nainital. Last month, Uttarakhand Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhama announced a special two-day

Assembly session to celebrate 25 years of the creation of the hill state. “This is our Silver Jubilee year. Over the past 25

years, our state has progressed through many ups and downs. Since its formation, there has been a long journey of develop-

ment. To discuss this in the Assembly, a two-day special session has been decided, and the dates will be announced soon,” he said.

Uttarakhand was created on November 9, 2000, as the 27th state of India, after being carved out of northern Uttar Pradesh. Initially named Uttaranchal, it was officially renamed Uttarakhand in 2007. The decision to create the new hill state followed decades of sustained activism and protests by the hill people, who felt neglected by the government in Lucknow and sought a separate state to preserve their distinct cultural identity and address specific developmental challenges related to the mountainous terrain. Earlier, CM Dhama reiterated the BJP-led state government’s focus on youth and employment generation. “The youth and students of our state have always been our top priority. Over the past four years, our government has transparently provided more than 25,000 jobs,” he said.

Urban Company sees Rs 59.3 crore loss in Q2 due to investments in Insta Help

Home services provider Urban Company on Saturday announced a net loss of Rs 59.3 crore in Q2FY26, a significant drop from a profit of Rs 6.9 crore in the previous quarter.

The loss was attributed to heavy upfront investments in its new daily-housekeeping vertical, Insta Help, which overshadowed strong revenue growth in its core services and products businesses, according to regulatory filings by the Gurugram-based firm.

The company posted a loss of Rs 1.82 crore in the July-September quarter last year, the company said.

While revenue from operations increased 37 per cent year-on-year to Rs 380 crore, the total expenses rose to Rs 462 crore from Rs 384 crore in Q1. This resulted in adjusted EBITDA turning negative at Rs 35 crore, compared with a profit of Rs 21 crore in Q1.

Insta Help reported an EBITDA loss of Rs 44 crore, and excluding this segment, Urban Company achieved an adjusted EBITDA profit of Rs 10 crore, accounting for 0.9

per cent of net transaction value (NTV), the company noted. “Early indicators for Insta Help are encouraging, with strong consumer adoption and repeat usage,” the company said in its shareholder letter. It added that it believed the segment holds “significant long-term opportunity and believes these investments are important to sustaining market leadership.” The company expects its adjusted EBITDA losses to continue in the near term due to further investments in the Insta Help vertical, despite its core India and international businesses remaining profitable and cash-generating. The company’s smart home products vertical, Native, which sells water purifiers and electronic door locks, recorded revenue of Rs 75 crore, up 179 per cent YoY, while losses narrowed to 9 per cent of NTV from 39 per cent in the previous year. The home services provider closed the quarter with Rs 2,136 crore in cash and equivalents, up from Rs 1,664 crore in the previous quarter, mainly due to proceeds from its recent IPO.
